





WHEN TO GO?

Thailand enjoys a tropical climate characterized by two seasons: dry and wet. The high season runs from November to April, during which you can enjoy warm and dry weather throughout the country. However, this is not the only time to consider for traveling...

Southwest Coast - Andaman Sea

On the west coast, the best weather extends from November to March, with cool breezes and pleasant temperatures between 26 and 32°C.

From March to May, the heat rises to around 30°C, perfect for sun lovers. For diving or snorkeling, the Surin and Similan Islands are open from November to May.

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Dry season

November - Early May

North and Central

The dry seasons in northern and central Thailand extend from November to May, during which you can expect very little rain on your adventures. The temperatures in November and December tend to be relatively cool, with a daily average of 17 to 20°C. However, starting from mid-January, temperatures begin to rise.

This is also the period when vibrant celebrations take place, such as:

- Yi Peng Lantern Festival (November) celebrated in Chiang Mai.
- · Surin Elephant Festival (November)
- · Chiang Mai Flower Festival (February)
- Songkran (April): The Thai New Year is celebrated enthusiastically throughout the country, especially in Bangkok.

Southeast Coast - Gulf of Thailand

If you visit the southeast coast, the best time is from December to February, when the weather is warm and dry.

Cool breezes make the temperatures pleasant, perfect for water sports. From March to May, temperatures rise between 29 and 35°C.

Rainy season

End of May - October

North and Central

In northern and central Thailand, high temperatures can continue long after the rainy season begins, leading to uncomfortable travel conditions due to elevated humidity levels.

Monsoon rains begin in June with brief showers, but they gradually become heavier and more consistent as the season progresses, peaking in August and September.

Southwest Coast – Andaman Sea

Monsoon rains arrive on the west coast around the end of May, often manifesting as brief afternoon showers. The heaviest rainfall typically occurs between September and October.

If you plan to visit western Thailand during the rainy season, we recommend taking advantage of the decreased number of visitors to explore activities away from the coastal areas. For instance, spending time in Khao Sok National Park is particularly rewarding during this time of year, as the park is especially lush and vibrant.



Southeast Coast - Gulf of Thailand

Light rains begin in June, but since they are infrequent and the number of visitors is lower, it's still a great time to visit the beach.

The monsoon truly sets in around the end of August, bringing heavier rains, higher temperatures, and increased humidity. Rainfall peaks between October and November.



Activities During the Rainy Season in Thailand

- Chiang Mai: Participate in craft workshops, visit museums (National Museum, Lanna Folklife Museum), or take Muay Thai and cooking classes.
- Chiang Rai: Explore iconic temples, including the White Temple (Wat Rong Khun) and the Blue Temple (Wat Rong Suea Ten).
- Bangkok: Visit shopping centers (Icon Siam, Paragon), explore museums (National Museum, Jim Thompson Museum), or enjoy a traditional Thai massage at Wat Pho temple.

These shallow, warm, and nutrient-rich waters provide ideal conditions for coral reef development, creating spectacular underwater landscapes that are must-sees for divers.




FULL MOON PARTY

PICTURESQUE HIKING TRAILS

The Ayutthaya period began in the 14th century when the Ayutthaya Kingdom replaced Sukhothai and established its capital in 1351.

Both Ayutthaya and Sukhothai are filled with beautiful temples and ruins, but Sukhothai stands out for its more authentic experience. If you're in Bangkok for a short time, Ayutthaya is the most accessible option.



PHIMAI HISTORICAL PARK

Another marvel of Khmer architecture from prehistoric times. Some of the monuments here may be even older than those found at Angkor Wat. Although these temples were built to honor Buddhism, they also reflect the influence of Hinduism and animism.

KWAI RIVER BRIDGE

During World War II, local populations and Allied prisoners of war were forced to build the "Death Railway," which includes the famous Bridge over the River Kwai. The bridge still stands today, and memorials honoring those who died during its construction are scattered throughout Kanchanaburi.


MUAY THAI

In total, over 100 areas across Thailand have been designated as national parks, most of which are ideal for camping and wildlife observation.



TRADITIONAL THAI MASSAGE

Traditional Thai massage is a product of ancient Eastern medicine, with a history of over 2,500 years. It combines yoga techniques and acupressure, stimulating the body's energy points. Thai massage should be seen as a spiritual practice closely connected to Buddhist teachings.

STREET FOOD



In recent years, street food has moved from just being simple stalls on the sidewalks to gaining recognition from the MICHELIN Guide. This guide awards stars to street restaurants or includes them in the Bib Gourmand list, which is a bit less prestigious than a star.



Michelin-Starred Restaurants in Bangkok

JAY FAI

Jay Fai is the only street food restaurant in Bangkok to earn a Michelin star. Its seafood specialties, such as the famous curry prawns and crab omelette, are especially popular.



WATTANA PANICH

Her slow-cooked beef noodle soup is irresistible, thanks to the intense flavors of Chinese herbs and the tenderness of the meat. What makes this dish so famous is that the beef broth has been simmered in a massive pot for over 50 years!







JEH O CHULA

Jeh O Chula is famous for its Tom Yum and is listed in the MICHELIN Bib Gourmand category for its excellent value for money.



Thip Samai Pad Thai is one of the best restaurants in Bangkok to enjoy authentic Pad Thai, featuring balanced flavors and beautiful presentation.





POTONG

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


